COVID-19 Vaccination Update



Village-Based COVID-19 Vaccination Clinics Scheduled for Feb. 19, 22, 23 & 26

DPHSS, in partnership with MCOG, and GDOE, continues village-based COVID-19 vaccination clinics on Friday, February 19 at the Agat Gym; Monday, February 22 at the Santa Rita Senior Center; Tuesday, February 23 at the Yona Gym; and Friday, February 26 at the Barrigada Community Center. Village-based COVID-19 vaccination clinic hours are scheduled from 9 a.m. to 3 p.m.

Although walk-ins are accepted, eligible village residents are encouraged to register with their respective mayor's office. Up to 100 doses will be administered at each clinic location.

The Department of Revenue and Taxation Announces Mandatory ELECTRONIC filing of Business Privilege Tax Returns

The Guam Department of Revenue and Taxation (DRT) today announces that all Business Privilege Tax Returns are required to be filed electronically, beginning with tax filing for the month of February 2021. Information below is provided to all current electronic filers and also for those who must register to become an electronic filer.

Current Electronic Filers:

• All must re-register with GuamTax.com. DRT recently enhanced the log-in process that will require all current users to re-register beginning March 1, 2021.

<u>Online Payments:</u>

- To pay online, more information can be found at https://pay.guam.gov/pg/FAQs.aspx. The additional fees are stated and in addition to the total.
- As an option to all E-Filers who decide on making their tax payments in person (not electronically): o
 - Please proceed to make payment to any Treasurer of Guam location, and
 - Provide two (2) copies of the e-filed returns.
 - As a reminder, Collections Branch at the Department of Revenue and Taxation will no longer accept payments on e-filed tax accounts.

Benefits on Electronic Filing:

- · Performs automatic calculations of taxes owed based on data entered
- Maintains e-filing history so you can access your e-filed GRT returns at your convenience
- Prevents duplicate filing
- · View and print copies of your e-filed returns

All Taxpayers must electronically file their tax returns beginning with tax period February 2021. An exemption application for this mandate will be made available soon at DRT's Barrigada location. Barrigada, GU - The Guam Department of Revenue and Taxation (DRT) announced the following regarding its drive-through services for filing of income tax returns, check payments of real property taxes, and check payments and filing of BPT returns.

Drive-Through Services 8 a.m. to 5 p.m. Friday, February 19, 2021 and Monday, February 22, 2021

INCOME TAX RETURN FILING

- Income Tax Returns with NO Payment: DRT will accept Income Tax Returns by Drive-Through Drop-Off at DRT's main office in Barrigada. Drive through drop off service is available for Income Tax Return filings ONLY for those filings with NO PAYMENT.
- Income Tax Returns with Check, Credit Card, or Cash Payments: Income Tax Return filings requiring check, credit card or cash payments must be paid at the Treasurer of Guam at the ITC Building.
- Online Payments Information regarding online payments can be found at https://pay.guam.gov/pg/payments.aspx.
- Form 1040 Distribution/Access Limited Forms 1040 and 1040SR are available at DRT's main office in Barrigada. Taxpayers may obtain forms during DRT's walk-in servicing hours (8 a.m. to noon Monday through Friday).

REAL PROPERTY TAX PAYMENTS

- Check Payments Only: Drive through drop off service is available for CHECK payments only for Real Property Taxes. 2020 Real Property Tax Statements are required to be presented when making payments. Individuals requiring a real property tax invoice must go to Real Property Tax Section to make request.
- Credit Card or Cash Payments: Credit card or cash payments must be paid at the Treasurer of Guam at the ITC Building. 2020 Real Property Tax Statements are required to be presented when making a payment at the Treasurer of Guam.
- Online Payments Information regarding online payments can be found at https://pay.guam.gov/pg/payments.aspx.

BUSINESS PRIVILEGE TAX FILINGS AND PAYMENTS

- Check Payments and BPT Filings with NO Payments: Drive through drop off service is available for CHECK payments only for Business Privilege Taxes and for BPT returns requiring no payment.
- Credit Card or Cash Payments: Credit card or cash payments must be paid at the Treasurer of Guam at the ITC Building. Taxpayers must bring two copies of their return when making payment.
- Online Payments: Information regarding online payments can be found at https://pay.guam.gov/pg/payments.aspx.

Individuals availing of DRT's Drive-Through Drop-Off services, must remain in their vehicles and must wear face masks. Filers will be directed to DRT's drive through drop off area.

GDOL Updates



\$181 Million for New Drawdown, Another \$14.1 Million in Unemployment

The Guam Department of Labor has another \$181 million in federal funds loaded into our payment management system to continue batching and paying unemployment claims. For Pandemic Unemployment Assistance \$97 million is available in the account, and another \$84 million is available for Federal Pandemic Unemployment Compensation.

"We were able to get these funds into our system in just over a week which is unprecedented. I have to give credit to my hardworking staff, including my administrative services officer for having the request ready to go. This goes to show that my staff and the way we are running our program is an indication of why they were able to fund us so quickly," said Department of Labor Director David Dell'Isola .

\$14.1 million in unemployment

The agency also ran it's third unemployment batch of the year which yielded \$14.1 million in benefits. Of that amount, \$7.6 million is in PUA, \$6.5 million is in FPUC and about \$58,500 is in Lost Wages Assistance. Another \$1.2 million will go toward federal withholding taxes.

All clear claims in the system were batched and claimants can expect funds to be in accounts by the end of this week or early next week.

"This makes for more than \$54 million we've been able to disburse to our unemployed in just two months, and about \$560 million total we've paid out since June 2020. My department continues to work with our governor and lieutenant governor to ensure we're prioritizing getting these funds out to the people in order to ease some of the strains of the pandemic," Dell'Isola said.

The Department of Labor plans to continue batching bi-weekly, and claimants can expect the next set of unemployment funds to be ready for distribution March 2.

SOUTH KOREA

COVID-19 News

- New daily cases stayed in the 300s for the third consecutive day during the Lunar New Year holiday, with social distancing measures eased
- New virus infections have been slowing down since the third wave of the pandemic peaked in late December
- Government decided to lower social distancing levels by one notch for the greater Seoul area and the other regions until February 28, but retained a ban on gatherings of five people or more
- South Korea secured 76 million vaccines with plans to begin February 26, with government estimating to have herd immunity by November; vaccination plan shown in appendix

Market Intelligence

- Florida has been one of the most popular vaccine tourism destinations for domestic and international travelers; thousands of Americans cross state lines for the vaccine
- Israel, where COVID vaccination rate is more than 40%, is pushing to resume tourism exchanges using vaccination certificates with many countries
- Although travel and visiting relatives during the Lunar New Year holiday was discouraged, number of tourists and returnees to Jeju island was estimated at 153,000 pax







- Number of new cases in Tokyo have remained below 500 for eight consecutive days.
- Number of infected people has declined by 78% compared to the first half of January.
- Governor Koike commented that there is a need to reduce the number of new cases; number of cases aged 65 and older are on the rise.
- A total of 1,131 people have died in Tokyo to date.
- Untraceable cases exceed over 50% and household infection remains high.









COVID-19 VACCINATION



- The government has officially approved a coronavirus vaccine developed by Pfizer on February 14th.
- The government is scheduled to start the vaccination program around February 17th.
- The government is planning to provide free coronavirus vaccinations to all residents age 16 and older.
- ✓ About 10,000 to 20,000 front-line health care workers at about 100 state-run hospitals will be vaccinated first, followed by a further 3.7 million health care workers.
- ✓ Vaccination tickets are set to be sent to about 36 million people age 65 and older within the second half of March.
- ✓ Other priority groups include 8.2 million people with chronic conditions, 2 million nursing care workers for older people and 7.5 million people age 60 to 64.
- ✓ Vaccinations for the general public are expected to start from around May or later.
- ✓ The government has signed contracts with Pfizer, fellow U.S. pharmaceutical firm Moderna Inc. and AstraZeneca PLC for a total of 314 million doses.



SOUTH KOREA EXTENDS SPECIAL TRAVEL ADVISORY UNTIL MARCH 17



The South Korea foreign ministry extended the special advisory on February 15, recommending against traveling overseas, as the coronavirus pandemic is continuing.

The advisory, now effective until March 17,2021, also calls for South Koreans to cancel their trips and for those staying outside of the country to take extra precautions. The measure was first imposed in March, last year.



VACCINATION PLAN

- Korean government plans to vaccinate high-risk health care workers at hospitals and people at elderly care facilities in the first quarter. According to KDCA, 776,900 residents at long-term care facilities will be vaccinated by the end of March.
- The plan is to immunize 70% of the population by the third quarter, and achieve herd immunity by November.





VACCINE TOURISM: THOUSANDS OF AMERICANS CROSS STATE LINES FOR INJECTIONS

Florida has been one of the most popular vaccine tourism destinations for domestic and international travelers alike, due to the state's initial policy of vaccinating anyone over the age of 65 years old.

With more than 50 unique vaccination plans across the United States, one's access to the COVID-19 vaccine depends in large part on where one lives.

This complex system has given rise to a new type of pandemic travel – dubbed "vaccine tourism" – in which people cross state or even country lines to get earlier access.



CURRENT STATUS

- People from Canada, Brazil, New York, Georgia, Minneapolis and even in Venezuela have visited Florida for COVID-19 vaccination.
- The state recently implemented new ID rules in an attempt to direct more vaccines to Florida residents, but it was not before about 50,000 out-ofstate recipients got a dose.

PROBLEM

- Even a small percentage going to outof-state recipients in any state can affect the entire country's vaccination infrastructure and reduce the vaccine availability for its local population.
- Vaccine tourism disrupts the success of jurisdictions' vaccine rollout since cities and states receive batches of the vaccine from the federal government based on the adult population in the area and plan their distribution strategy accordingly.






MORE THAN 150,000 PAX VISITED JEJU ISLAND DURING LUNAR NEW YEAR

PREMIER SAYS TAIWAN HAS OBTAINED 20 MILLION COVID VACCINE DOSES



Premier Su Tsenachang announced on Wednesday (Feb 10) has Taiwan that million vaccine doses, as the distribution push forward with its homegrown program.

In a Facebook post about COVID-19 jab availability, Su said as of Wednesday, Taiwan has purchased secured around 20 4.76 million shots via the coronavirus WHO-led global vaccine platform country continues to COVAX. It has also landed deals to ensure vaccine supplies of 10 million AstraZeneca vaccinations and 5.05 million Moderna doses.

MODERNA TO SUPPLY 5 MILLION COVID-19 VACCINE DOSES TO TAIWAN

- American pharmaceutical company Moderna Inc. said Tuesday it has entered into an agreement with the Taiwan government for the supply of 5 million doses of COVID-19 vaccine.
- Although the Moderna vaccine has not yet been approved for use in Taiwan, the company said, it will work with regulators to pursue the necessary approval prior to distribution.
- In a statement, Moderna also said it has agreed to supply 10 million doses of the COVID-19 vaccine to Colombia and that the deliveries to both governments will begin in mid-2021.

TAIWAN SETS NINE PRIORITY GROUPS FOR RECEIVING COVID VACCINE

- The Central Epidemic Command Center (CECC) said on Tuesday (Feb. 9) that members of the public are divided into nine priority groups for receiving COVID-19 vaccines in three rollout phases, with health care workers and epidemic prevention workers the first in line.
- In the first phase, an estimated 999,300 people in the first five priority groups will be vaccinated, and the second phase will only start when 2 million COVID-19 vaccine doses have been secured
- The five groups are medical personnel; disease prevention staff at central and local governments; essential personnel who maintain the normal functions of society; long-term care staff, social welfare workers, caregivers and soldiers.
- In the second phase, people aged 65 or older will be inoculated when Taiwan gains access to 2-10 million doses of COVID-19 vaccines.





- Short-term business travelers eligible for shortened quarantine periods in Taiwan, except for those who have obtained
 permission for their application, are now required to complete the 14-day home quarantine.
